To be considered for honors in history, graduating seniors, in addition to meeting the College's general requirements for honors, must have achieved a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.6 and a major GPA of 3.7 by the end of their seventh semester, and completed both recommended and required work listed above by the end of their final semester.
